CHUCK LATHAM'S CHARLTON HISTORY—FACTS and LEGEND

Traveling to School—Then, And Now (con't) From REMINISCENCES by Winifred McConchie Palmateer, May 29,1992

...In the spring when the snow began to melt, we often had to walk the stonewall fences to get home if the water happened to be running down the road instead of in the creek by the side of the road where it should have been.

As soon as we became old enough to go to high school, we were allowed to drive a horse. I remember it cost father ten dollars a year for a place for us to keep the horse in a stable near the school.

Usually we drove a blind horse. Every time she went through the stable door she went in such a hurry that you got stepped on if you weren't careful. Once I forget to unsnap the strap from one of the shafts of the wagon before I started through the door with her. In desperation I tried to stop her when I saw the wagon was coming too. No double that little episode would have ended in a broken wagon if a boy who also kept his horse there hadn't been taking care of his horse at the same time. He raced for the wagon and undid the snap just in the nick of time.

Many times the lady who rented that barn warmed our soapstone on a cold winter night so that we could keep warm going home.

Thirty years ago the roads weren't plowed as they are today. If they weren't open so we could get through with the horse and cutter, we just did the next best thing—walk

Walking wasn't' bad unless you go caught on the barbed wire fence as you went over it and tore clothes, or unless that little white poodle which one of the farmers along the way owned, happened to be outside and sent you running pell-mell down the road with him in hot pursuit. Then you were lucky to escape without a hole in your skin to say nothing of your clothes.

How I hated that little dog! Every time I went by and that dog was outside, he nipped at the horse's feet. He was the worst little pest I ever saw. (To be continued)
