The Charlton Historical Society would like to let you know of the passing of three very special people during this past year. We offer our condolences to their families and friends.



Frank Overstrom, a longtime resident of Charlton, passed away on June 18th. Frank served for many years on the Board of the Charlton Historical Society as our Maintenance Man. In addition to routine maintenance, Frank oversaw several major projects to repair and preserve our two historic buildings. Frank joined General Electric in 1954 and donated generously to help the CHS remain in the GE More Gifts More Givers program, from which the CHS received significant matching donations while the program was in effect.



Florrie Belisle passed away this past September 5th. Like Frank, Florrie also served on the Board of the Charlton Historical Society, volunteering to help with many projects and events. Florrie was a teacher for many years and brought a teacher's viewpoint to Board discussion.

CHUCK LATHAM'S CHARLTON HISTORY—FACTS AND LEDGEND

From *Reminiscences* by Winifred McConchie Palmateer

FALL

Have you ever walked outdoors on a sunny afternoon in lake August and suddenly realized that fall was almost here? How did you know? The crickets told you first. They have no calendar, and yet they're never mistaken. Just stand still and listen for a few minutes. You'll soon become aware there is a difference in their chirping, and it seems that every cricket within hearing distance is joining in the symphony. If you'll think back to the day, you first noticed the change in their song last year, you'll remember it was exactly the same kind of day. The sun shone down from a clear blue sky; the weather was warm, but not humid; and the sun was farther west in the sky than it had been all summer at that time of day. If there was a wind, it was a gentle one.

Unless the reaction I get on a day like this is peculiarly my own, which I doubt, you, too, will suddenly become engulfed in a calm, peaceful feeling that makes you glad you are alive. Consciously, or you may feel, "God is his Heaven; all's right with the world," and wish the serenity of that moment could continue indefinitely.

To me, that day is the beginning of the most pleasant of all seasons. Oh, I know there will be other hot humid days before the season ends, but the hot spells will be less frequent and of shorter duration, This is the time of year I'll look for more clear, blue skies which always remind me of the poem about October's bright blue weather; it's the time of year we watch for especially cool evenings and cover the flowers and tomato plants which we know will last much longer I they survive the first frost.

Now, after the lull following the rush connected with summer work, the farmers will be busy harvesting their fall crops. Sometimes we watch helplessly while a farmer leaves his corn crop so long the frost ruins all he and nature have done all summer to get it ready for harvest.

Now we look for the rains to come and soak up the earth, usually parched after the summer weather, before the ground freezes over. We know that, unless we get it, there's real danger our men may have to draw water for cattle and the household use long before spring arrives.

We are aware that one species of bird after another have disappeared from its habitat, and we know that if we watch and listen on the particularly bright moonlight nights in October, we will hear the honking of the waterfowl, and maybe see them against the moon, as they wing their way for warmer places.

Fall is the season another school year starts. No Teacher can approach the opening of a new school year without apprehension. To the child, to the parent, to her profession, to society, to the taxpayer, and to herself, the teacher has an obligation. Every child in the classroom has been entrusted to her care, and the success or failure of each child will depend to some extent on her. (I firmly believe we have no way of knowing at what moment something we do or say will influence the whole future of someone else's life. either good or bad.) The beginning of each new school year brings a challenge each teacher meets the best way she knows how.

No one could live through fall in this region and not be aware of changes in the leaves. Gradually the deciduous trees lose their summer green and turn to delicate shades of brown, yellow, and red. Many people go on rides just to enjoy their breathtaking beauty. Then, one rainy or damp day, the leaves will start floating down. Before long the trees have lost their beautiful covering. Soon we'll recognize the pungent odor of burning leaves and see a thin wisp of smoke, or more often, a small a black cloud of smoke, curling skyward as someone attempts to burn a pile of them. One day those leaves that aren't raked and burned, will be scooted across the fields and lawns or blown into protected places by chilly angry winds that are warning you the soon snow will be blowing instead of leaves.
